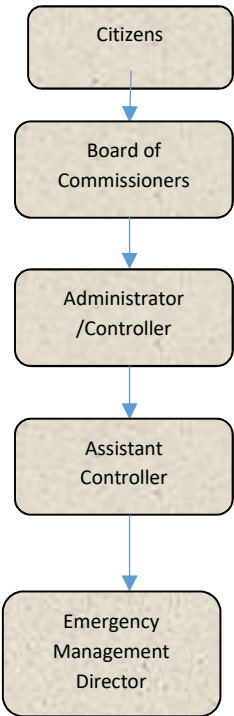


Emergency Management



Activities

Emergency management is concerned with protecting the people and properties of Jackson County.

The division continues to work with the public safety community and public health community, along with local critical infrastructure and key resources to mitigate, prepare, respond and recover from potential disasters.



Strategic Plan Impact

✓ Safe Community

Working with the Department of Homeland Security and the Michigan State Police Emergency Management Division, it is the goal of Emergency Management to make Jackson a safer community utilizing an all-hazards approach in dealing with potential disasters.

Accomplishments

- Jackson County Emergency Management was an instrumental component during the Covid-19 Pandemic. Through leadership and motivation, the Emergency Management Office procured many needed resources to keep our community safe and allowed for First Responder Agencies to be adequately protected.
- Jackson County Emergency Management received and processed 289 requests for PPE from 84 agencies. A total of 358,469 items were distributed through the Emergency Management Office.
- Director Jason Breining was recognized as the 2021 Michigan Emergency Management Professional for Jurisdictions Greater than 60,000 population.
- Jackson County Emergency Management, in cooperation with MSU Extension, created a local program (ERAIL) aimed at serving Michigan's animal agriculture industry by providing resources to assist in the response to an accident that involves animals.
- Jackson County received \$60,369.39 (FY2019), \$43,788.51 (FY2020) and \$22,958.54 (FY2021) from the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP)
- Jackson County received \$35,905.00 from the 2021 Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) and \$18,714.00 from the 2021 EMPG American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).
- Jackson County received \$1,500.00 from the 2021 Hazardous Materials Emergency Planning Grant (HMEP)

Jackson County OEM participated in several Regional and Local exercises in 2020-2021.

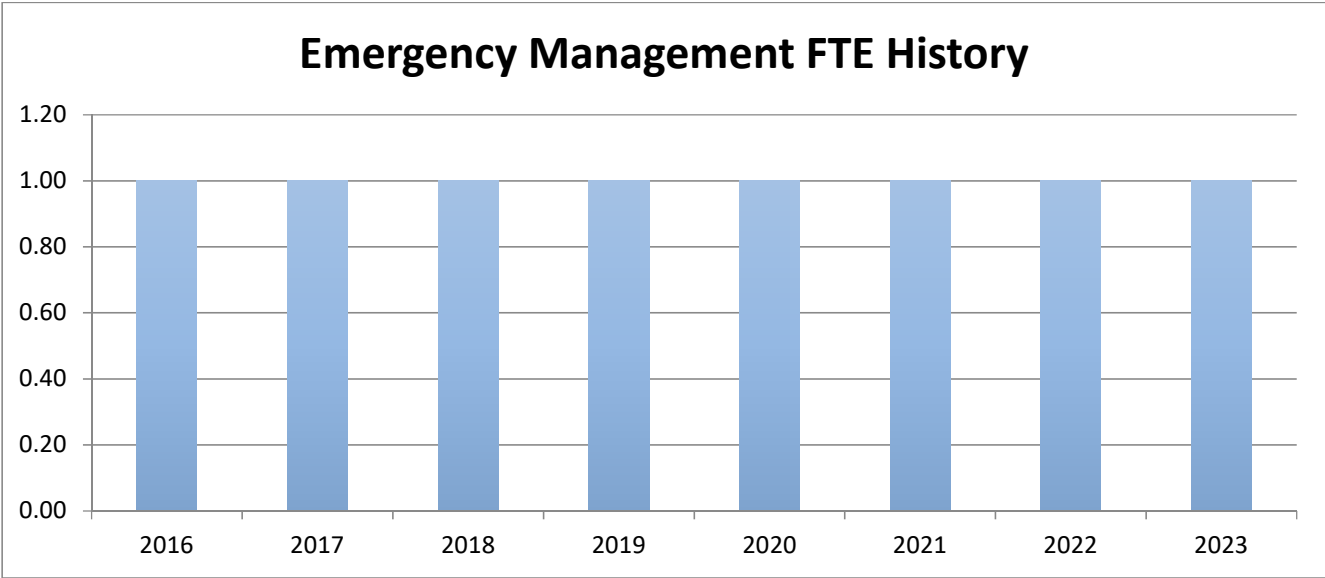
- Jackson County OEM participated in several local, regional and state exercises.
- Jackson County participated in the Statewide Tornado Drill and Severe Weather Preparedness week in March.
- Jackson County OEM hosted a high-angle communications tower rescue full-scale exercise with the Jackson County Urban Search and Rescue Team, Napoleon Township Fire Department and Jackson County 911. This was held at the Jackson County Department of Transportation Clark Lake Road location. .
- Jackson County Emergency Management participated in the Statewide Rising Waters/Northern Exposure exercise in 2021. This exercise included local County, City and Township agencies.
- Jackson County Emergency Management hosted a multi-scenario tabletop exercise for Jackson County Fair and Keeley Park staff.
- Jackson County OEM completed a comprehensive report identifying critical infrastructure and key resources (CIKR) locations throughout Jackson County.
- Private sector business emergency and safety plans were reviewed and assessed by Jackson County OEM
- Off-site response plans and Tier II reports were updated for all Hazardous Materials sites within Jackson County.

Emergency Management

- Jackson County OEM facilitated, reviewed and approved Emergency Plans for Western, Vandercook Lake and East Jackson Schools, so they aligned with the 2022 Michigan State Police Competitive School Safety Grant.
- Jackson County OEM updated local support plans for communities with a population of 10,000 or more as required by Mi.PA.390.
- Code Red Mass notifications were sent out 31 times during 2021 for missing children, endangered missing adults, lockdown events, traffic crash roadway closures, weather warnings, situational awareness and life safety events

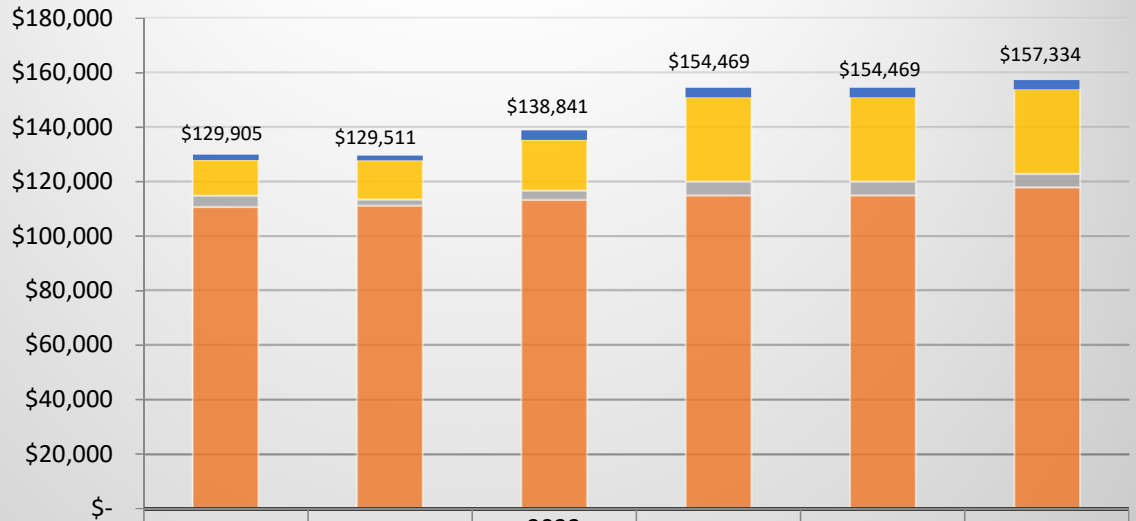
Budget Adjustments
