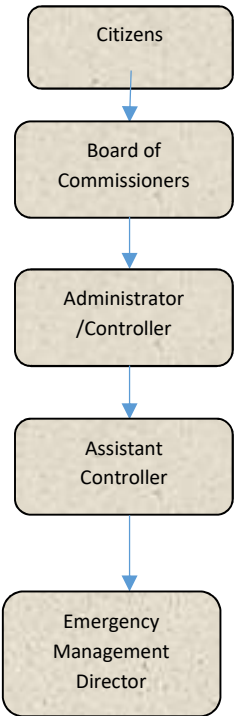


# Emergency Management



## Activities

Emergency management is concerned with protecting the people and properties of Jackson County.

The division continues to work with the public safety community and public health community, along with local critical infrastructure and key resources to mitigate, prepare, respond and recover from potential disasters.



## Strategic Plan Impact

### ✓ **Safe Community**

Working with the Department of Homeland Security and the Michigan State Police Emergency Management Division, it is the goal of Emergency Management to make Jackson a safer community utilizing an all-hazards approach in dealing with potential disasters.

## Accomplishments

- Jackson County Hazard Mitigation Plan received FEMA approval and is valid for 5 years.
- Jackson County Emergency Action Guidelines were updated and distributed to key stakeholders.
- Jackson County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) was an instrumental component during the Covid-19 Pandemic. During the summer of 2022, Jackson County Emergency Management, held a multi-agency after action review of local response to the Covid-19 pandemic. This included representatives from Jackson County 911, Jackson County Health Department, Napoleon Township Fire Department, Blackman-Leoni Township Department of Public Safety, City of Jackson Fire Department and Michigan Department of Health and Human Services.
- Jackson County OEM received and processed 309 requests for PPE from 102 agencies. A total of 529,030 items were distributed through the Emergency Management Office.
- Jackson County OEM, in cooperation with MSU Extension, created a promotional video for the Emergency Response to Accidents Involving Livestock (ERAIL) program. This program is aimed at serving Michigan's animal agriculture industry by providing resources to assist in the response to an accident that involves animals.
- Jackson County OEM introduced the MSP STEP (Student Tools for Emergency Preparedness) program to local elementary schools.
- Jackson County received \$\$43,788.51 (FY2020) , \$22,958.54 (FY2021) and \$30,210.14 (FY2022) from the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP)

- Jackson County received \$ \$42,057.00 from the 2022 Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) Jackson County received \$1,500.00 from the 2022 Hazardous Materials Emergency Planning Grant (HMEP)

## **Jackson County OEM participated in several Regional and Local exercises and Trainings in 2022-2023.**

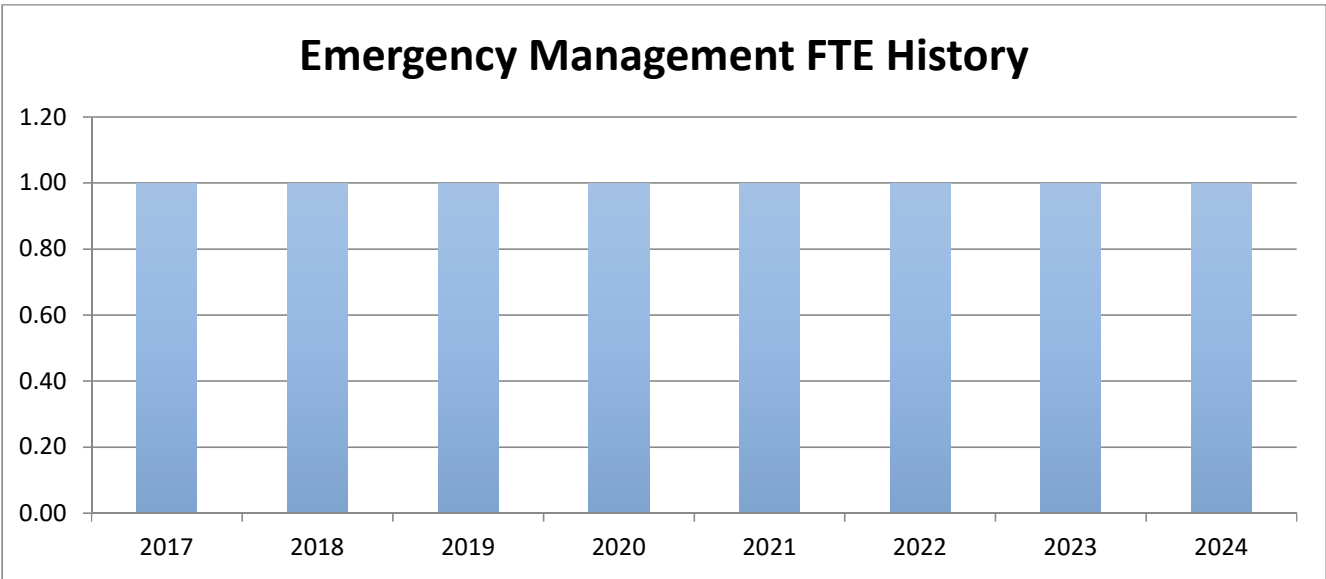
- Jackson County OEM participated in several local, regional and state exercises.
- Jackson County participated in the Statewide Tornado Drill and Severe Weather Preparedness week in March.
- Jackson County OEM hosted multi-agency Terrorist Chemical Tabletop Exercise, Terrorist Related Chlorine Leak Tabletop Exercise,
- Jackson County OEM hosted a multi-scenario tabletop exercise for Jackson County Fair and Keeley Park staff.
- Jackson County OEM completed a comprehensive report identifying critical infrastructure and key resources (CIKR) locations throughout Jackson County.
- Private sector business emergency and safety plans were reviewed and assessed by Jackson County OEM
- Off-site response plans and Tier II reports were updated for all Hazardous Materials sites within Jackson County.

# Emergency Management

- Jackson County OEM met with local school districts to review and update their Emergency Response Plans
- Jackson County OEM hosted FEMA ICS 300 and ICS 400 courses.
- Code Red Mass notifications were sent out 42 times during 2022 for missing children, endangered missing adults, lockdown events, traffic crash roadway closures, situational awareness and life safety events. 40 notifications were sent for weather warnings.

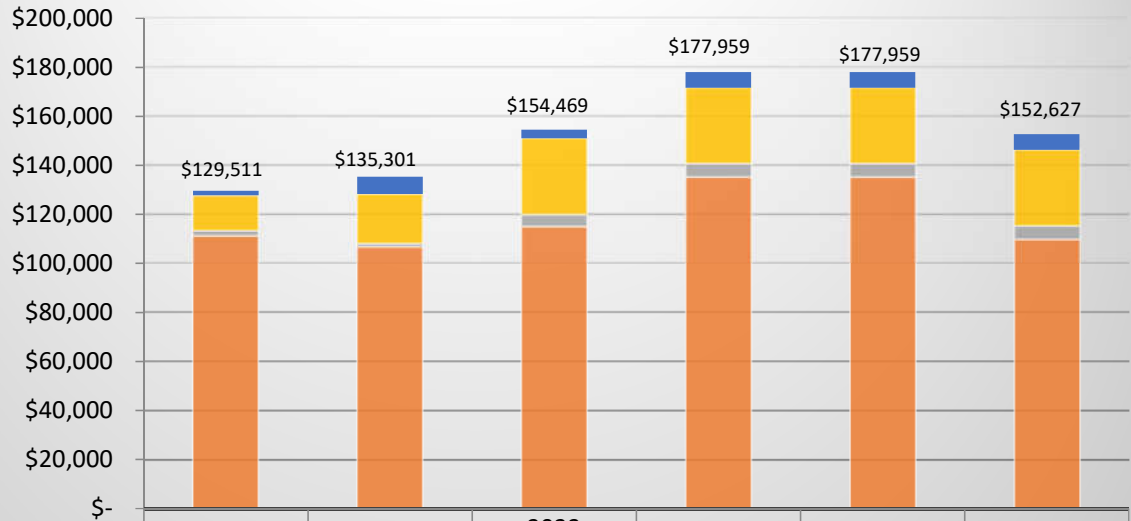
## Budget Adjustments

There are no significant adjustments to this program.



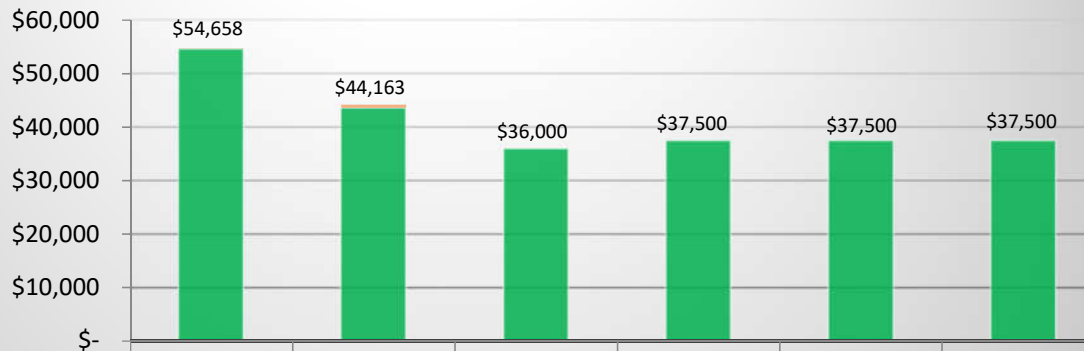
